## Executive Summary

The following report is provided pursuant to Resolution No. R-701-22, sponsored by Commissioner Kionne L. McGhee, and adopted by the Board of County Commissioners (the “Board”) on July 19, 2022. Resolution No. R-701-22 approved the Miami-Dade County Community Violence Intervention (“CVI”) Initiative’s plan, and through a floor amendment by former County Commissioner Joe A. Martinez, required the County Mayor or County Mayor’s designee to provide an initial report and quarterly reports thereafter to the Board providing the following information for individuals who participated in programs or received benefits from any entity funded by the Carrie Meek Foundation (the “Foundation”): (1) age; (2) district where said individuals reside; (3) race; and (4) sex. This consolidated report covers the July 2023, October 2023, January 2024, and April 2024 reports.

CVI is a national model and a community-centered approach to gun violence prevention that identifies those who are at the highest risk and works to reduce violence through targeted community-based intervention strategies. The County’s CVI initiative is a countywide and community-led strategy that further builds upon and strengthens the County’s existing anti-gun violence strategy, along with the Peace & Prosperity Plan administered by the Office of Neighborhood Safety (“ONS”), the County’s Anti-Violence Initiative/Group Violence Initiative administered by the Miami-Dade County Juvenile Services Department (“JSD”) in partnership with the Miami-Dade Police Department (“MDPD”), the Reentry Plan administered by Miami-Dade Corrections and Rehabilitation, and the 2023 Anti-Violence State Appropriation funding and enforcement efforts led by MDPD. Championed by Congresswoman Frederica S. Wilson, the County has received a \$963,000 federal earmark for youth development and empowerment initiatives to support the expansion of the Fit2Lead program and provide scholarships to college enrolled and college-bound young adults.

The CVI initiative, through the Foundation’s Supporting Safer Communities program, engaged and supported organizations to lead innovative programming in communities impacted by gun violence via a Request for Proposals (“RFP”). The Foundation received 246 proposals of which 82 were awarded funding. In addition, the Foundation released a Capacity Building and Technical Assistance Grant Request for Qualifications (“RFQ”) to provide support to the RFP grant recipients. The Foundation received 21 proposals of which two were awarded funding. Appendix A includes a list of the 84 organizations that were awarded funding via the RFP and RFQ, a brief description of the funded projects, and the grant amount awarded to each organization.

On February 28, 2024, the Foundation hosted the grant recipients and community stakeholders at the Dennis C. Moss Cultural Arts Center to showcase the various violence prevention and intervention, mental health, and reentry services that CVI is funding in communities across the County. In addition to presentations by several grant recipients, District 9 Commissioner Kionne L. McGhee, a representative from the Office of District 8 Commissioner Danielle Cohen-Higgins, and County Mayor Daniella Levine Cava delivered remarks focusing on the importance of the County's CVI Initiative and the impact it will have on stemming violence in our communities.

### Background

Through Resolution No. R-701-22, the Board unanimously approved CVI with an investment of \$8,943,000 of which \$8,135,560 is being administered, managed, and distributed to the community by the Foundation with oversight by the Miami-Dade County Office of Management and Budget (“OMB”) and ONS. ONS received an allocation of \$375,000 to provide scholarships to young adults attending college or a post-secondary program. The Children’s Village, Inc., a member of the Together for Children Coalition, was awarded \$400,000 to hire natural helpers within communities impacted by gun violence and to coordinate the 130 organizations that are in the Together for Children network with a focus on capacity building, implementing preventative solutions to support youth and families. The Melissa Institute for Violence Prevention and Treatment (“Melissa Institute”) was awarded \$65,000 to provide trauma informed care training to credible messengers, natural helpers, and volunteer youth sport coaches. In addition, \$7,295,560 was dedicated to build upon and strengthen the County’s CVI infrastructure through a competitive process for community organizations to lead efforts in the following areas: (1) reentry services; (2) high-risk intervention work; (3) mental health, trauma, and wellness; and (4) capacity building and training and technical assistance.

### Report

In April 2023, through its Supporting Safer Communities Program, the Foundation released an RFP inviting nonprofit organizations, including small grassroots groups, to apply for \$7,155,560 in grant funding to lead innovative programming in communities impacted by gun violence. The Foundation received 246 proposals for more than \$87 million, of which 82, or 33%, of the proposals were funded.

As previously reported, the Foundation also entered into agreements with the Melissa Institute and the Children’s Village. In March, the Melissa Institute launched the training initiative to provide trauma-informed care training to the CVI grant recipients providing direct services via a hybrid online and in-person model. The Children’s Village hired a Natural Helper Coordinator and filled the six Natural Helper positions. Each of the six Together for Children neighborhood coalitions (Liberty City/Brownsville, Perrine/Goulds/Richmond Heights, Overtown, Miami Gardens/Opa-Locka, Northeast Corridor, and Homestead/Florida City/Naranja) are assigned a Natural Helper to work closely with the organizations that make up the coalition in connecting parents and children to holistic wraparound services that include, but are not limited to, education support, childcare, mental health and wellness, nutrition, and at-risk prevention.

The CVI initiative was designed to have a countywide reach with an emphasis on serving communities and individuals disproportionately affected by gun violence. Through February 29, 2024, a total of 1,310 residents were served by 51 CVI-funded organizations, of which 51% of those served were 17 or younger, with an average age of 18. The majority of individuals served identify as Black/African American (63%), while 14% of those served identify as Hispanic/Latino, and 72% identify as female. There were 1,302 individuals with verifiable addresses, and eight were undisclosed due to homelessness or the individual's inability to provide a residence location due to other factors. Miami-Dade County Commission Districts 1, 2, 3, 8 and 9 are home to 79% of the individuals served by the CVI Initiative. It is important to note that while Miami-Dade County experienced a significant decrease in gun homicides, the aforementioned commission districts experienced 81% (125 of 154) of gun homicides in 2023 and 75% (154 of 204) in 2022.<sup>1</sup> Table 1 provides a breakdown, by Commission district, of the number of residents served by the CVI Initiative as of February 29, 2024. See Appendix B for additional figures displaying demographic data.

The remaining 33 funded organizations are in the project implementation phase or received funding for an initiative or event that is scheduled to occur or has occurred on or after March 1, 2024. The next CVI report will include demographic data for individuals served by these organizations.

In addition to the above, the Foundation released a Capacity Building and Technical Assistance Grant RFQ to provide support to the CVI RFP grantees. The RFQ focused on enhancing grantee

capacity to successfully execute their programs, in addition to increasing grantee effectiveness in service delivery, compliance with grant contracts, organizational leadership, collaboration, and operational management. Applicants had to demonstrate expertise in providing diverse services, including training sessions, one-on-one support, and continuous coaching throughout the grant cycle. The Foundation received 21 proposals of which the following two were awarded funding:

- Radical Partners, LLC: Awarded \$98,000 for strengthening grantee organizations through customized training, leadership and collaboration support, ongoing monitoring, adaptive strategies, policy navigation and long-term sustainability planning.
- Mc3 Consulting, Inc.: Awarded \$42,000 to implement their Results-Based Accountability initiative, which includes data collection and reporting plans for grantees, utilizing surveys, interviews and focus groups for a more nuanced approach.

### Conclusion

The CVI initiative places community stakeholders at the center of its efforts as both the provider and recipient of services. The strategy brings more than 80 unique community partners with diverse program offerings together to address the root causes of gun violence. With investments in youth development, mental health, reentry, family dynamics, education, employment, and vocational training, to name a few, the CVI initiative is positioned to have a multi-generational impact (neo-natal to older adults) in communities. Moreover, by investing in the organizations through capacity building, the County is further strengthening the collective ability to render effective and sustainable solutions to gun violence. The CVI initiative is a critical component of the multi-pronged approach that our County has embraced with bold actions and investments to stem gun violence in our communities and create a County where all residents are safe and thriving.
