Marshall L. Davis, Sr. African Heritage Cultural Arts Center in Liberty City has been a vital part of Miami-Dade for 50 years, offering children lessons in acting, dancing, singing, music, stage management, costume making, cinematography, and more. Its alumni include renowned artists like Tarell Alvin McCraney (Oscar winner for Moonlight), Willerm Delisfort (pianist and composer), Shareef Clayton (trumpeter with the Duke Ellington Orchestra), and Robert Battle (former Artistic Director of Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater). The Center hosts annual events such as the Sankofa Jazz Festival (April), Revelations In Rhythm (May), and Art Blues & Soul Festival (December), premier films, and features visual arts exhibitions in the Amadlozi Gallery.

Experience a Legacy of Elegance with 12 historically inspired costumes by fiber artist Margarette Joyner, engaging with 19th-century portraiture. Joyner skillfully merges traditional and contemporary African textiles, featuring cowry shell embellishments, to reimagine high-society garments and their cultural significance across diverse African-descended communities.

"Black Beauty as an Act of Resistance" explores the cultural significance of hair and beauty rituals for people of African descent. Set in a 1930s back-porch hair shop, the exhibit celebrates the resilience and legacy of women who used beauty as a form of empowerment, including those who hid rice grains



and Underground Railroad maps in their hair. It also honors David and Laurel Julius, founders of the Sunlight School of Beauty Culture in Overtown in 1936, highlighting Laurel's role as a former stylist for Madame CJ Walker and their influence on beauty culture in Alabama and Jamaica.

Double Exposure

A.J. Brown is a versatile artist in music and visual art. As the lead singer of Third World Band, he explores genres like classical, rock, neo soul, and reggae. In his visual art, he draws inspiration from European, African, Asian, and Caribbean histories, using acrylics to capture nature's vibrant colors. His work includes portraiture, abstraction, landscapes, and still life, reflecting the cultural richness of America, Jamaica, Ethiopia, and the Caribbean diaspora.



Davis, Sr. African Heritage Cultural Arts Center's Winds of Heritage Dance Company presents Revelations In Rhythm, featuring alum and Tap Dance phenom Marshall Davis, Jr. This live performance celebrates African rhythms and American tap dance, highlighting how tap dance evolved from sacred traditions and music created by Black individuals during enslavement as a form of spiritual practice, prayer, and praise. Join us and experience an extraordinary fusion of dance and history that pays homage to these powerful legacies!





Academies

Academies include After School Arts Academy, Spring Arts Workshop, Summer Arts Conservatory, and Kuumba Winter Arts Workshop. All Academies are tuition-based. Financial assistance may be available. Transportation is available in limited geographic areas.

The After School Arts Academy offers artistic learning experiences after school, starting at 2:00 PM. It consists of five 8-week sessions that align with the Miami-Dade Public Schools calendar.

The Kuumba Winter Arts Workshop and Spring Arts Workshop are provided during winter and spring breaks. Both programs explore the cultural heritage of the African Diaspora through performance and visual arts classes. Students ages 5 to 16 attend five to six classes daily, from 8:30 AM until 5:00 PM, with early drop-off at 7:30 AM. At the end of the program, students present the results of their explorations in a special showcase for parents, families, and friends. Research shows that engaging in the arts enhances critical thinking, boosts confidence, and improves academic skills. Enroll your child today to empower them through the arts and foster cultural appreciation.

Saturday Arts Workshop offers students a safe environment and additional arts training. Classes in dance, instrumental music, dramatic and visual arts are from 10:30 AM until 2:00 PM October through April. Join us to enhance your child's artistic skills and creativity!

The Summer Arts Conservatory at the Marshall L. Davis, Sr. African Heritage Cultural Arts Center is a premier nine-week intensive program offering children ages 5 to 16 an opportunity to explore visual and performing arts. Creative experiences include professional development workshops, masterclasses, field trips, and more. The Center supports parents who desire to have their child in a safe, creative learning environment during the summer break.

During the Miami-Dade Public School summer break from June to August, students participate in theater, vocal music, instrumental music, dance, visual arts, fashion design, technical arts, and literary arts. The program helps students develop artistic skills, enhance academics, improve social skills, focus on health and fitness, and build self-esteem.

Through the Instrumental Start Fellowship, a select number of students receive their choice of instruments, a year of lessons, and mentorship from the Cleveland Orchestra. Students also hear from renowned authors, performing and visual artists, and DAHCAC alumni at Village Talk, encouraging them to pursue their dreams and goals. Notable alumni include former Alvin Ailey Artistic Director Robert Battle, dancer Bianca Brewton, Academy Award Winner Tarell McCraney, and Grammy-nominated jazz trumpeter Shareef Clayton.

Students in this academy participate in 6 classes M-F from 7:30 AM - 6:00 PM, concluding with five major productions. Many of the Center's alumni began their journey to success through this program.
